In Morningside Heights, a community wants to plan its own future

The Council is crafting a plan with uptown locals in what could be a "new path" for neighborhood rezonings

Issues & Campaigns

Institutional Reopening During the Pandemic: Is it Safe?

One of the unique features of Morningside Heights is the presence of so many esteemed institutions of higher learning. These institutions enrich our community.

However, as colleges and universities consider under what circumstances they can reopen in the fall (assuming they're permitted to do so by the governor), it is critical they take the well-being of our neighborhood and city residents into account in their decision-making. MHCC has written to the heads of Columbia University, Barnard College, Teachers College, Union Theological Seminary, Jewish Theological Seminary, Manhattan School of Music, and Bank Street College. We reminded them to consider our community in making difficult decisions on the terms of their reopening.

As of June 8, there have been 2,335 cases of the COVID 19 virus and 262 deaths in the two zip codes of Morningside Heights and West Harlem, 10025 and 10027. Older residents of the neighborhood and low-income people of color in nearby public housing are particularly vulnerable to the virus.

Thanks to the great work of our health care workers and the practice of social distancing by our neighbors, the threat has been reduced. However, we fear the influx of thousands of students and employees into our neighborhood could seriously threaten the progress we have achieved. MHCC has requested meetings with each school to discuss their plans and advocate for the well-being of our neighbors, as well as students, faculty and staff.

The Morningside Heights Community Fund

With funds contributed by institutions and developers in Morningside Heights, the MHCC has established the Morningside Heights Community Fund (MHCF). The Fund is administered by the New York Community Trust, a large and esteemed charitable organization.

Using an initial contribution by The <u>Jewish</u>
<u>Theological Seminary</u>, MHCF recently made grants of \$5,000 each to Broadway
Presbyterian Church and St. Mary's
Episcopal Church, for food programs serving local residents. It also granted

MHCC \$10,000 to continue its local work. Using contributions anticipated later in the year, MHCF expects to make additional grants to neighborhood groups making positive impacts.

Issues & Campaigns

Rezoning Morningside Heights

MHCC and the Morningside Heights community have come a long way toward rezoning our neighborhood.

We have worked closely with all our local elected officials, particularly Council Member Mark Levine and Manhattan Boro President Gale Brewer, to contact our member base, community stakeholders, and the Department of City Planning. We wrote articles and drew press attention; engaged residents at sidewalk tabling; and researched and issued a <u>"soft site study"</u> of locations vulnerable to overdevelopment. We organized large, open meetings to discuss community needs and issued a report (<u>Morningside Speaks!</u>). We presented our preliminary plan at a February 2018 MHCC Town Hall meeting and circulated petitions signed by over 1,000 residents supporting rezoning. All these efforts led to Council Speaker Corey Johnson's September 2019 announcement that he was formally committing to developing a viable rezoning plan for approval by City Council vote.

Morningside Heights, surrounded by other areas that have been rezoned, has been targeted by developers taking advantage of outdated, "as-of-right" zoning to combine lots and air rights and build tall,

out-of-context luxury towers.

When MHCC's formal zoning challenge to the 34-story Vandewater was rejected by the Department of Buildings, we re-doubled our efforts. We determined to deliver a rezoning plan that will promote as much affordable housing as possible by sustaining stabilized units; providing development opportunities for affordable units where feasible; limit tall towers by selectively imposing height caps; increase community leverage in negotiations with developers; foster greater small business activity and opportunities; and preserve the unique character of Morningside Heights. Our <u>video</u> on the issue tells the story in 13 minutes.

MHCC has been conferencing with the City Council Land Use Group to refine the plan in preparation for conducting the required Environmental Assessment Statement before moving to the final approval stages and City Council vote. Once we can make arrangements, the Land Use Group and MHCC will be excited to share the plan for further feedback by specific stakeholders and the broader Morningside Heights community. Much progress but a robust effort must continue. Stay tuned.

Elevator Lobby

The escalators at the 125th station of the #1 train are old, frequently break down, and are not accessible to everyone, such as people with mobility challenges or strollers. Recognizing that the MTA's current capital budget contains billions of dollars for improving access to transit stations and that major new developments, such as Columbia's Manhattanville Campus, are occurring near the station, MHCC and Morningside Retirement and Health Services have formed the "Elevator Lobby." This group will campaign for elevators at the station. Local institutions, elected officials, and residents have already met to organize the Lobby and start planning a campaign. Meetings will resume after the public health crisis abates and the MTA's capital budget is clarified. If you would like to join us, please contact us at www.mhccnyc.org.
